2	BEFORE THE END OF THIS MEETING WHICH GOES ON FOR TWO
3	HOURS. AND SO HEARING NO OBJECTION, WE'LL TURN TO
4	THE RESEARCH BUDGET, AND I'LL TURN THE CHAIR OVER TO
5	YOU, MARK.
6	MR. FISCHER-COLBRIE: THANK YOU VERY MUCH,
7	GEORGE. AND WE'RE IN A GREAT TIME RELATED TO BOTH
8	SETTING OF THE BUDGET, THE LAUNCH OF THE STRATEGIC
9	ALLOCATION FRAMEWORK, AND THE ASSOCIATED NEW
10	PROCESSES ASSOCIATED WITH THAT THAT WE'RE VERY
11	EXCITED ABOUT THAT. AND SO WITH THAT, I'D LIKE TO
12	TURN IT OVER TO THE CIRM TEAM AND THE CIRM STAFF TO
13	PRESENT THE BUDGET FOR CONSIDERATION.
14	MS. J. LEWIS: LET ME GET MY PRESENTATION
15	UP HERE. GOOD AFTERNOON, CHAIR FISCHER-COLBRIE AND
16	CHAIR BLUMENTHAL, AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, PUBLIC,
17	AND CIRM TEAM. TODAY I'LL BE PRESENTING THE FISCAL
18	YEAR 25/26 BUDGET ALONG WITH MY COLLEAGUE CHIEF
19	SCIENCE OFFICER ROSA CANET-AVILES.
20	AS ALWAYS, WE START WITH OUR MISSION AT
21	CIRM. ACCELERATING WORLD-CLASS SCIENCE TO DELIVER
22	TRANSFORMATIVE REGENERATIVE MEDICINE TREATMENTS IN
23	AN EQUITABLE MANNER TO A DIVERSE CALIFORNIA AND
24	WORLD.
25	IN OUR AGENDA TODAY WE'LL WALK THROUGH THE
	-

1	TOTAL GRANT FUNDS OVERVIEW PER PROP 14 AND OUR
2	HISTORICAL SPEND. WE'LL TAKE A LOOK BACK AT THE
3	BUDGET THAT WAS APPROVED IN DECEMBER OF 2024 FOR
4	JANUARY THROUGH JUNE, THAT SIX-MONTH BUDGET. THEN
5	WE'LL PIVOT TO SOME OF THE BUDGET CONTEXT SETTING
6	GIVEN THE STRATEGIC ALLOCATION FRAMEWORK FOR THIS
7	PROPOSED BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 25/26.
8	SO THIS SLIDE SHOWS THE GRANT FUNDS
9	OVERVIEW AS OF THE END OF APRIL OF THIS YEAR. WE
10	HAVE 7.72 BILLION TOTAL GRANT FUNDS. TOTAL GRANT
11	FUNDS COVERS BOTH PROP 71 AND PROP 14. AS YOU CAN
12	SEE, THE ENCUMBERED AMOUNT HAS INCREASED TO JUST
13	OVER 4 BILLION AND THE UNENCUMBERED IS 3.64 BILLION.
14	ENCUMBERED MEANS NOT JUST PAID PAYMENTS OUT THE
15	DOOR, BUT ALSO COMMITMENTS THAT THE BOARD HAS MADE
16	AND THAT ARE CONTINUING IN THEIR GRANT LIFE CYCLE.
17	THIS NEXT SLIDE SHOWS SPECIFICALLY
18	PROPOSITION 14. SO PROPOSITION 14 HAS SPECIFIC
19	ALLOCATIONS RELATED TO OUR RESEARCH BUDGET. AS OF
20	APRIL 30TH, THE FIRST COLUMN HERE SHOWS THE
21	COMMITMENT OF 3.4 BILLION THAT IS EARMARKED FOR
22	RESEARCH, THERAPY DEVELOPMENT, AND THERAPY DELIVERY.
23	TO DATE WE HAVE COMMITTED 865 MILLION.
24	THE SECOND BAR IS SHOWING DISEASES OF THE
25	BRAIN AND CENTRAL NERVOUS SYSTEM, WHICH IS 1.38

1	BILLION. UP TO DATE, 525 MILLION HAS BEEN
2	COMMITTED.
3	AND THE LAST BAR IS SHOWING THE 96 MILLION
4	FOR ACCESS AND AFFORDABILITY. JUST ABOUT 2 MILLION
5	HAS BEEN COMMITTED TO DATE.
6	ADDITIONALLY, THERE ARE TWO EARMARKS THAT
7	ARE UP TO AMOUNTS IN THE PROPOSITION RELATED TO THE
8	RESEARCH THAT FIRST BAR, THERAPY DEVELOPMENT AND
9	RESEARCH DEVELOPMENT. THAT FIRST IS THERE IS 26
10	MILLION ALLOCATED TO BUILD AND EQUIP SHARED
11	RESOURCES LABS. AND TO DATE WE HAVE COMMITTED 21
12	MILLION TO THAT EARMARK. AND THE SECOND BAR IS
13	COMMUNITY CARE CENTERS, WHICH IS 78 MILLION. AND TO
14	DATE WE HAVE NOT COMMITTED THOSE FUNDS, BUT YOU WILL
15	SEE THAT EXPLAINED FURTHER IN MY BUDGET PRESENTATION
16	FOR 25/26.
17	AND THEN LASTLY, THIS SLIDE IS SHOWING
18	SINCE JANUARY 2021, SINCE PROP 14 WAS LAUNCHED, THE
19	HISTORICAL BUDGET PERFORMANCE. I'D LIKE TO NOTE
20	THAT IN THE FIRST BAR YOU'LL SEE THAT THE FIRST YEAR
21	THAT COUNTS TOWARD THE PROPOSITION. THE PROPOSITION
22	GIVES SPECIFICS ON A YEARLY BASIS OF HOW MUCH CIRM
23	CAN SPEND. THAT FIRST BAR IS A SHORTER TIMELINE
24	IT'S NOT A FULL YEAR. IT'S A SIX-MONTH YEAR DUE
25	TO THE BRIDGING THAT WAS NEEDED BETWEEN THE TWO

1	PROPOSITIONS. SO IT'S KIND OF A UNIQUE YEAR
2	COMPARED TO THE OTHERS OR THAT WERE NOT A FULL YEAR.
3	AND AS YOU CAN SEE, THE YELLOW COLUMN IS
4	SHOWING THE COMMITTED FUNDS FOR EACH OF THOSE FISCAL
5	YEARS WHILE THE GREEN IS SHOWING THE UNCOMMITTED.
6	AND THEN FOR FISCAL YEAR 24/25, YOU WILL NOTICE THAT
7	THERE'S A PURPLE PENDING THERE'S A SMALL PENDING
8	AMOUNT THAT IS ACTUALLY APPROVAL TODAY.
9	SO NOW I'LL PRESENT THE FISCAL YEAR 24/25
10	JANUARY THROUGH JUNE APPROVED RESEARCH BUDGET. SO
11	THE FIRST COLUMN IS SHOWING THE APPROVED BUDGET,
12	WHICH ALLOCATED 265 MILLION ACROSS CLINICAL,
13	TRANSLATIONAL, DISCOVERY, EDUCATION, AND
14	INFRASTRUCTURE. AS OF TODAY, THERE ARE 143 MILLION
15	COMMITTED THAT WERE APPROVED BY THE APPLICATION
16	REVIEW SUBCOMMITTEE DURING THIS TIME. AND WE ARE
17	ESTIMATED TO FINISH AT 147 MILLION AT THE END OF
18	JUNE. THE ASTERISK IS SHOWING THAT JUST THIS
19	MORNING THE ARS APPROVED ONE ADDITIONAL GRANT, SO
20	NOW THAT WILL BE COMMITTED. SO OUR FINISH FOR THE
21	YEAR WILL BE 147 MILLION.
22	AND THEN THE VARIANCE IS SHOWING 117
23	MILLION. AND I'D LIKE TO WALK YOU THROUGH EACH OF
24	THOSE CATEGORIES TO GIVE AN EXPLANATION OF THAT
25	VARIANCE.

1	SO FOR CLINICAL THERE IS A VARIANCE OF
2	ABOUT 13.6 MILLION. AND THAT IS DUE TO AWARDS THAT
3	WERE NOT RECOMMENDED FOR FUNDING BY THE GWG GIVEN A
4	TIER III. FOR TRANSLATION THERE IS A BALANCE OF
5	ABOUT 2.5 MILLION.
6	FOR DISCOVERY, I WANTED TO FOCUS ON THAT
7	FOR A SECOND AS DISCOVERY HAS A BALANCE OF 41
8	MILLION. AND THE REASON FOR THAT IS THAT THE
9	MAJORITY OF THOSE FUNDS, 37.1 MILLION, WAS ALLOCATED
10	FOR THE DISCOVERY ZERO ROUND. THAT DISCOVERY ZERO
11	ROUND WAS INTENDED TO HAVE APPLICATIONS COME IN
12	DURING JANUARY THROUGH JUNE, HAVE A GWG, AND BE
13	APPROVED BEFORE THE END OF THE FISCAL YEAR.
14	HOWEVER, DUE TO EARLY IN THE FISCAL YEAR OR EARLY IN
15	THE CALENDAR YEAR, IN JANUARY, IN SOUTHERN
16	CALIFORNIA THERE WERE WILDFIRES.
17	AND DUE TO THE VOLUME OF POTENTIAL
18	APPLICANTS THAT WERE COMING FROM THAT PORTION OF THE
19	STATE, CIRM MADE THE DECISION TO POSTPONE THE
20	APPLICATION SUBMISSION DATE TO ALLOW APPLICANTS
21	ACROSS THE STATE MORE TIME TO APPLY. THEREFORE, THE
22	APPLICATIONS ARE COMING IN, AND THIS ROUND WILL
23	HAPPEN. HOWEVER, THE ACTUAL AWARDS WILL NOT BE
24	APPROVED UNTIL 25/26. SO ESSENTIALLY WHAT YOU'LL
25	SEE WHEN I PRESENT THE PROPOSED BUDGET IS THIS

1	ALLOCATION IN THE NEW PROPOSED BUDGET.
2	FOR EDUCATION THERE IS \$155 REMAINING IN
3	THAT BUDGET. AND FOR INFRASTRUCTURE THERE ALSO IS A
4	LARGE VARIANCE OF 60 MILLION. THAT ALLOCATION, THAT
5	60 MILLION, WAS FOR THE COMMUNITY CARE CENTERS OF
6	EXCELLENCE THAT AT THE BEGINNING OF WHEN THIS BUDGET
7	WAS APPROVED IN DECEMBER, THE PLAN WAS TO HAVE THOSE
8	APPROVED BY THE END OF THE FISCAL YEAR. HOWEVER, AS
9	THE BOARD DISCUSSED IN THE MARCH MEETING, THE
10	COMMUNITY CARE CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE WAS AMENDED TO
11	ALLOW FOR TWO NEW PATHWAYS, SEPARATING INTO DELIVERY
12	AND SUPPORT. SO THOSE FUNDS WILL BE REQUESTED IN
13	THE NEXT FISCAL YEAR AS THOSE NEW CONCEPTS, THOSE
14	AMENDED CONCEPTS AND NEW CONCEPTS ARE DEVELOPED.
15	NOW I'D LIKE TO PASS OVER TO MY COLLEAGUE,
16	ROSA, TO WALK THROUGH THE BUDGET CONTEXT FOR THE
17	STRATEGIC ALLOCATION FRAMEWORK.
18	DR. CANET-AVILES: THANK YOU, JENN. WE
19	CAN STAY BACK ON THE BUDGET CONTEXT. SO THIS, AS
20	JENN WAS MENTIONING, TO SET THE STAGE, THE NEXT FOUR
21	SLIDES WILL GROUND US ON THE STRATEGIC ALLOCATION
22	FRAMEWORK AND HOW IT INFORMS OUR BUDGET DECISIONS.
23	THE FRAMEWORK THAT WE ARE ALL FAMILIAR WITH IS NOT
24	JUST A PLANNING TOOL, BUT IS A MECHANISM TO STAY
25	ALIGNED WITH MISSION-DRIVEN OUTCOMES WHILE WE ALSO

1	ADAPT TO CHANGES IN THE FIELD. NEXT SLIDE.
2	SO AS WE ALL KNOW AND WE'VE SEEN THIS
3	SLIDE MANY TIMES, THE SAF WAS BUILT AROUND A SET OF
4	QUANTIFIABLE, TIME-BOUND IMPACT GOALS THAT ALIGN
5	DIRECTLY WITH OUR MISSION. THOSE GOALS INCLUDE,
6	FIRST, CATALYZING NEW TARGETS AND BIOMARKERS TO
7	DRIVE OUR DISCOVERY PIPELINE. SECOND IS
8	ACCELERATING ENABLING TECHNOLOGIES TO IMPROVE
9	THERAPEUTIC DEVELOPMENT, WILL HELP PRECLINICAL AND
10	CLINICAL AS WELL. THE THIRD AND FOURTH HAVE TO DO
11	WITH CELL AND GENE THERAPY APPROVALS, ADVANCING RARE
12	DISEASE PROJECTS TOWARDS REGULATORY APPROVAL, AND
13	PROPELLING 15 TO 20 THERAPIES AFFECTING CALIFORNIANS
14	INTO LATE STAGE TRIALS.
15	THE FIFTH GOAL HAS TO DO WITH OUR MANDATE
16	FOR ACCESSIBILITY AND AFFORDABILITY TO ENSURE THAT
17	ALL BLA-READY PROGRAMS HAVE AFFORDABILITY AND ACCESS
18	STRATEGIES. AND THE AAWG JUST APPROVED A NEW
19	TOOLKIT THAT WE ARE IMPLEMENTING INTO OUR
20	PRECLINICAL AND CLINICAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS.
21	AND FINALLY, WE HAVE BUILDING A WORKFORCE
22	THAT REFLECTS AND SERVES THE FUTURE OF REGENERATIVE
23	MEDICINE.
24	THESE GOALS DEFINE WHAT SUCCESS LOOKS LIKE
25	OVER THE NEXT SIX TO TEN YEARS. NEXT SLIDE.

1	SO THE STRATEGIC ALLOCATION FRAMEWORK OR
2	SAF HELPS CIRM STAY FOCUSED ON WHAT MATTERS MOST
3	WHILE ALSO REMAINING RESPONSIVE TO A RAPIDLY
4	EVOLVING FIELD. THE FRAMEWORK WAS DESIGNED TO FIRST
5	RESPOND TO CHANGES IN BOTH SCIENCE AND POLICY. FOR
6	EXAMPLE, WE HAVE A DEEPER UNDERSTANDING NOW OF THE
7	BASIC BIOLOGY AND CELL FATE DECISIONS, WHICH ALLOWS
8	US TO MOVE BEYOND PROOF OF CONCEPT AND MORE INTO
9	MECHANISMS AND TREATMENT OPTIMIZATION AND GETTING
10	THOSE THERAPIES ACCESSIBLE AND AFFORDABLE. SO WE
11	ARE IN A DIFFERENT STAGE OF THE FIELD THAT IS
12	REFLECTED IN OUR IMPACT GOALS.
13	THE SAF ALSO INCORPORATES KEY CHANGES
14	UNDER PROP 14, INCLUDING A RENEWED FOCUS ON CNS,
15	CENTRAL NERVOUS SYSTEM, CONDITIONS AND A MANDATE TO
16	ENSURE THE ACCESSIBILITY AND AFFORDABILITY AS WELL
17	AS THE ADDITION OF GENE THERAPY TO CIRM'S SCOPE.
18	MORE THAN A STRATEGIC FEAT, THIS REPRESENTS A
19	PHILOSOPHICAL ONE. WE ARE NOW SETTING QUANTIFIABLE
20	GOALS THAT DEFINE WHAT CIRM'S LEGACY WILL BE. AND
21	THE SAF SETS A SIX- TO TEN-YEAR HORIZON TO REACH
22	THOSE IMPACT GOALS. AND IT USES AN ADAPTIVE MODEL
23	THAT ALLOWS US TO REVIEW THE PRIORITIES ANNUALLY
24	BASED ON DATA FROM OUR PORTFOLIO AS WELL AS EXTERNAL
25	LANDSCAPE. AND THAT IS A SEPARATE PRESENTATION THAT

1	WE WILL BE PRESENTING ON JUNE 26TH ICOC. SO WE WILL
2	PRESENT THE PORTFOLIO ASSESSMENT THAT WILL INFORM
3	THIS ADAPTIVE MODEL.
4	SO THE MODEL ALLOWS FOR FLEXIBILITY, BUT
5	IT ALSO UNDERSCORES THE CRITICAL POINT. ONCE GOALS
6	ARE SET, CONTINUOUSLY SHIFTING FOCUS OR DILUTING
7	RESOURCES CAN UNDERMINE OUR ABILITY TO ACHIEVE THEM.
8	SO STAYING DISCIPLINED IS HOW WE WILL DELIVER
9	RESULTS THAT MATTER. NEXT SLIDE.
10	SO THIS BRINGS US TO HOW THE SAF ADAPTIVE
11	MODEL WILL BE IMPLEMENTED OPERATIONALLY. THIS SLIDE
12	IS REPEATED IN THE OTHER PRESENTATION, BUT THIS IS
13	JUST AN IDEA OF HOW WE WILL DO THIS. EVERY YEAR WE
14	WILL PERFORM A COMPREHENSIVE ANALYSIS OF CIRM'S
15	INTERNAL PORTFOLIO ALONGSIDE WITH AN EXTERNAL
16	LANDSCAPE. AND THIS WILL BE INFORMING OUR ADAPTIVE
17	PREFERENCE SETTING BY THE BOARD. WITH THE BOARD'S
18	APPROVAL, THIS WILL BE REFLECTED IN UPDATED OR NEW
19	FUNDING CONCEPTS. SO WE'RE SETTING THE PREFERENCES
20	ANNUALLY EVERY JANUARY.
21	THIS CYCLE ENSURES THAT EVERY DOLLAR THAT
22	WE INVEST IS ALIGNED WITH WHERE WE ARE TODAY AND
23	WHERE WE NEED TO GO TO MEET THE GOALS.
24	AND THIS NEXT SLIDE IS THE LAST SLIDE. IT
25	FINALLY TO BRING THIS ALTOGETHER IN THE BUDGET

1	CONTEXT, AND THIS IS ANIMATED. SO IN THE BUDGET
2	CONTEXT TO HOW WE DETERMINE HOW MANY AWARDS WE
3	SHOULD MAKE EACH YEAR AS A FUNCTION OF OUR ADAPTIVE
4	STRATEGIC PLANNING, IT COMES DOWN TO THIS SIMPLE
5	EQUATION. THE NUMBER OF AWARDS PER YEAR IS DRIVEN
6	BY THE SPECIFICS OF THE IMPACT GOALS THAT WE ARE
7	TRYING TO REACH PER PROGRAM AND DIVIDED BY THE
8	EXPECTED SUCCESS RATES AND THE NUMBER OF YEARS
9	PROJECTED. SO LET ME WALK YOU THROUGH THE LOGIC.
10	SO WE START WITH OUR IMPACT GOALS THAT
11	SHOULD BE REFLECTED IN RED AS JUST ONE. THESE ARE
12	FIXED TARGETS THROUGH THE SAF, HOW MANY THERAPIES OR
13	DISCOVERIES WE AIM TO ADVANCE TO A SPECIFIC
14	MILESTONE BY A CERTAIN YEAR.
15	THE NEXT ONE, NOT EVERY PROJECT WILL
16	SUCCEED. SO WE HAVE TO INCORPORATE TARGET RATES
17	USING DATA FROM OUR HISTORICAL PORTFOLIO AND FROM
18	EXTERNAL SOURCES TO ESTIMATE HOW MANY ATTEMPTS IT
19	TAKES TO GET ONE SUCCESS.
20	LASTLY, THE STRATEGIC PLAN, THE YEARS THAT
21	WE HAVE PROJECTED ARE THE PRODUCT OF THE PROJECTIONS
22	IN DEVELOPING THE SAF AND GOALS THAT WE SET GIVEN

1	ADJUSTED FOR THE TARGET RATES AND DIVIDED ACROSS THE
2	YEARS THAT WE HAVE LEFT. THE GOAL HERE IS TO
3	DELIVER DATA DRIVEN AND ALIGNED WITH OUR MISSION.
4	AND THIS GIVES US THE FRAMEWORK THAT IS BOTH
5	ASPIRATIONAL, BUT ALSO GROUNDED IN DATA AND THE
6	REALITY OF THE FIELD. AND THAT IS THE FINAL SLIDE
7	FOR THIS CONTEXT SETTING. THANK YOU, JENN.
8	MS. J. LEWIS: THANK YOU, ROSA. SO WITH
9	THAT CONTEXT, I'D LIKE TO MOVE FORWARD IN PRESENTING
10	TO YOU THE 25/26 PROPOSED RESEARCH BUDGET. THE
11	MAJOR DRIVERS OF THIS RESEARCH BUDGET INCLUDE ARS
12	APPROVALS OF GRANT APPLICATIONS FOR THE NEW, AMENDED
13	PROGRAMS THAT INCLUDE THE DISC4, PDEV, AND CLIN2
14	CONCEPTS AND AMENDMENTS THAT WERE APPROVED IN MARCH,
15	CIRM-INITIATED GRANTEE CONFERENCES, DISCO
16	APPLICATIONS THAT ARE TARGETED FOR SEPTEMBER
17	APPLICATION REVIEW SUBCOMMITTEE AND, LASTLY, FOR THE
18	COMMUNITY CARE CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE FOR TWO
19	CONCEPTS RELATED TO DELIVERY AND SUPPORT PROGRAMS.
20	SO THE FIRST COLUMN HERE I'LL FOCUS ON THE
21	RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT PIPELINE. SO THE FIRST
22	COLUMN IS DISCOVERY BUDGET. WE'RE REQUESTING A
23	TOTAL BUDGET OF 121.1 MILLION, WHICH INCLUDES A
24	REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS FOR DISC-0 AT 37.1 MILLION,
25	WHICH WE ESTIMATE THERE WILL BE ROUGHLY 12 AWARDS.

1	ADDITIONALLY, THE DISC4 PROGRAM FOR 84 MILLION,
2	WHICH IS AN ESTIMATE OF SIX AWARDS. ADDITIONALLY,
3	THERE'S A REQUEST FOR THE TRANSLATIONAL BUDGET FOR A
4	TOTAL OF 160 MILLION. THIS IS FOR THE PDEV PROGRAM
5	WHICH IS AN ESTIMATE OF 16 AWARDS THAT INCLUDE BOTH
6	MECHANISMS THAT WERE APPROVED IN THE CONCEPT.
7	ESTIMATING SEVEN AWARDS FOR THE LATE STAGE PROGRAM,
8	A LATE STAGE PATH, AND THEN NINE AWARDS FOR THE
9	STAGED PATHWAY.
10	AND THEN LASTLY, THE CLINICAL BUDGET, A
11	TOTAL OF 135 MILLION WHICH IS AN ESTIMATE OF NINE
12	AWARDS THAT WOULD BE FUNDED UNDER THAT BUDGET FOR
13	THE CLIN2 PROGRAM.
14	FOR EDUCATION, WE'RE REQUESTING A BUDGET
15	OF 1.5 MILLION. THIS IS TO SUPPORT CIRM-INITIATED
16	CONFERENCES WHICH WOULD INCLUDE OUR PAN TRAINEE
17	CONFERENCE MEETING IN 2026, THE SPARK 2026 MEETING,
18	A POTENTIAL 2026 GRANTEE MEETING, AND POSSIBLY ANY
19	OTHER NETWORK MEETINGS THAT MAY COME UP FROM THE
20	PROGRAM TEAM.
21	AND THEN LASTLY, THE INFRASTRUCTURE
22	BUDGET, A TOTAL 51 MILLION WHICH WOULD SUPPORT THE
23	COMMUNITY CARE CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE DELIVERY
24	CONCEPT OF 36 MILLION AND THE SUPPORT FOR COMMUNITY
25	CARE CENTERS OF EXCELLENCE OF 15 MILLION.

1	SO THIS IS THE TOTAL BUDGET WOULD COME
2	TO 468.6 MILLION. AND THE REQUEST WOULD BE FOR THE
3	MEETING TODAY TO RECOMMEND APPROVAL TO THE ICOC OF
4	THE FISCAL YEAR 25/26 RESEARCH BUDGET. AND, CHAIR
5	FISCHER-COLBRIE, I'LL HAND IT BACK OVER TO YOU AND
6	BE HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS.
7	MR. FISCHER-COLBRIE: GREAT. I'D LIKE TO
8	ASK FOR A MOTION TO DE FACTO APPROVE THIS BUDGET
9	WITH THE RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD THAT THEY
10	FURTHER APPROVE THIS IN THE SUBSEQUENT MEETING. SO
11	IF I COULD GET A MOTION ON THAT, THAT WOULD BE
12	GREAT.
13	DR. YAMAMOTO: SO MOVED.
14	MR. FISCHER-COLBRIE: AND A SECOND?
15	DR. GOLDEN: SECOND.
16	MR. FISCHER-COLBRIE: GREAT. AND WITH
17	THAT, LET'S OPEN IT UP FOR DISCUSSION. I WASN'T
18	SURE ON THE SEQUENCE. JUDY, YOU WANT TO LEAD OFF?
19	MR. TOCHER: JUDY, I BELIEVE YOU ARE
20	MUTED.
21	DR. GASSON: FIVE YEARS TO FIND THE MUTE
22	BUTTON. SORRY ABOUT THAT.
23	SO THE ENTIRE SCIENTIFIC BIOMEDICAL WORLD
24	HAS CHANGED SIGNIFICANTLY SINCE WE STARTED THIS
25	PROCESS. AND SOME OF THESE CHANGES WERE NOT REALLY

1	CHANGES THAT WE COULD HAVE ANTICIPATED. AND THERE'S
2	NO WAY THAT CIRM IS GOING TO BE ABLE TO MAKE UP IN
3	ANY WAY, SHAPE, OR FORM FOR THE DECREASES IN FUNDING
4	THAT ARE BEING EXPERIENCED THROUGH THE NIH.
5	HOWEVER, I WANTED TO SPECIFICALLY ADDRESS
6	THIS DISC-O FUNDING LINE OF \$37 MILLION. WE
7	ANTICIPATED RECEIVING 150 APPLICATIONS FOR THE
8	DISC-0 OPPORTUNITY. AND INSTEAD WE RECEIVED 371.
9	THIS OPPORTUNITY REPRESENTS THE HIGH IMPACT BASIC
10	RESEARCH FOUNDATION THAT WILL LEAD TO OUR FUTURE
11	TRANSLATIONAL AND CLINICAL RESEARCH PROGRAMS FROM
12	CIRM THAT WILL BENEFIT PATIENTS AND THEIR FAMILIES.
13	AND SO I WOULD LIKE TO, BECAUSE THE NUMBER
14	OF APPLICATIONS TO BE CONSIDERED DOUBLED, I WOULD
15	LIKE TO PROPOSE THAT WE CONSIDER DOUBLING THE
16	FUNDING FOR THE DISC-0 OPPORTUNITY AT THIS TIME.
17	MR. FISCHER-COLBRIE: OKAY. THANK YOU,
18	JUDY. AND WE'LL GET TO EVERYBODY'S COMMENTS HERE
19	AND COME BACK AND REVISIT THAT JUST MOMENTARILY
20	HERE. SO PAT.
21	DR. LEVITT: SEVERAL. ONE IS IT LOOKS
22	LIKE WE LEFT 41 MILLION ON THE TABLE LAST FISCAL
23	YEAR IN TERMS OF THE DISC GRANTS. IT'S VERY
24	DISAPPOINTING, TO BE HONEST, BECAUSE WE HAD
25	SITUATIONS IN WHICH WE WERE INFORMED THAT THE REVIEW

1	COMMITTEE RECOMMENDED FUNDING, BUT WE COULDN'T DO IT
2	BECAUSE WE WERE CAPPED IN THAT PARTICULAR CATEGORY.
3	YET THERE WAS 41 MILLION THAT WAS NOT SPENT ON DISC
4	GRANTS.
5	I'M ASKING HOW FLEXIBLE ARE THESE
6	PREFERENCE SETTING GOALS OCCUR JANUARY. HOW
7	FLEXIBLE ARE THEY DURING THE YEAR SO THAT WE DON'T
8	HAVE A SITUATION IN WHICH WE HAVE WHICH WE CANNOT
9	PREDICT? THE HIGH QUALITY IN ONE DOMAIN THAT HAS A
10	CERTAIN AMOUNT OF MONEY THAT'S BEEN ALLOCATED TO IT,
11	RIGHT, ONE OF THE PROGRAMS, AND MOVING FUNDS BETWEEN
12	THOSE AREAS. IF WE'RE SETTING THIS IN JANUARY AND
13	WE'RE SETTING A CAP, THEN WE'RE GOING TO HAVE THE
14	SAME ISSUE.
15	I'D SAY FOR AN AGENCY, IF THEY CONTINUE TO
16	FUND ANYTHING, LIKE NIH, IT IS THE CASE THAT THE
17	BRANCHES ARE PROVIDED THE BRANCHES THAT ARE
18	OVERSEEING FUNDING ARE PROVIDED WITH A DOLLAR
19	AMOUNT, BUT SEVERAL OF US HAVE BEEN ON COUNCIL WHERE
20	THERE'S LOTS OF DISCUSSION ABOUT MOVING THINGS
21	AROUND BECAUSE, IN A PARTICULAR TIME, THERE HAVE
22	BEEN EXCEPTIONAL APPLICATIONS IN ONE AREA THAT WERE
23	UNEXPECTED, AND WE DIDN'T WANT TO TURN THOSE AWAY.
24	SO THIS IS REALLY A QUESTION ABOUT
25	FLEXIBILITY. WE CAN'T DO ANYTHING ABOUT THE 41

1	MILLION THAT WAS LEFT ON THE TABLE AND NOT FUNDING
2	SOME GRANTS THAT WERE RECOMMENDED FOR FUNDING, BUT
3	WE COULDN'T BECAUSE WE HIT AN ARTIFICIAL CEILING
4	FROM MY PERSPECTIVE. BUT WHAT'S THE FLEXIBILITY
5	GOING TO BE GOING FORWARD?
6	MR. FISCHER-COLBRIE: I THINK, J.T., IF
7	YOU'D LIKE TO ADDRESS THAT POINT FOR PAT AND WITH
8	THE PROVISO THAT WE WILL GET BACK TO JUDY'S DE FACTO
9	RECOMMENDATION AND PROPOSAL. SO THAT IS THERE. SO
10	I DON'T WANT TO LOSE SIGHT OF THAT. BUT, J.T., IF
11	YOU WANT TO COMMENT ON PAT'S.
12	DR. THOMAS: THANK YOU, MARK. AND THANK
13	YOU, JUDY AND PAT, FOR YOUR COMMENTS. I'M GOING TO
14	START WITH JUDY'S COMMENT BECAUSE IT THEN FEEDS INTO
15	A RESPONSE TO PAT'S COMMENT.
16	SO WITH RESPECT TO THE DISC-0 ROUND, IT'S
17	IMPORTANT FOR EVERYBODY TO RECALL THAT THIS IS OUR
18	LAST SO-CALLED LEGACY ROUND THAT WE'RE FUNDING
19	BEFORE THE SAF KICKS IN FULL TIME. AND IN OTHER
20	WORDS, THERE WILL BE NO OTHER DISC-O ROUNDS. THERE
21	IS A PROGRAM THAT'S SORT OF THE NEXT EVOLUTION OF
22	DISC-0, WHICH IS DISC5 THAT'S COMING IN A YEAR OR
23	SO. BUT THIS IS THE LAST OF THE LEGACY ROUNDS.
24	SO WITH RESPECT TO THIS ISSUE OF SHOULD WE
25	INCREASE THE BUDGET FOR DISC-0 GIVEN IT IS THE LAST

1	OF ITS KIND, IF YOU WILL, I THINK THE WHICH, OF
2	COURSE, ALL OF THESE DECISIONS ARE A HUNDRED PERCENT
3	BOARD PREROGATIVE. BUT WE BELIEVE, AS ROSA TALKED
4	ABOUT AND WE DISCUSSED MANY TIMES, WE DO HAVE TO
5	EXERCISE FINANCIAL DISCIPLINE, BUT THERE ARE
6	CIRCUMSTANCES WHICH DO ARGUE FOR CONSIDERATION OF
7	ALTERNATIVES. AND THIS BEING THE LAST OF THAT ROUND
8	AND THE FACT THAT WE ACTUALLY HAD MORE THAN TWO
9	TIMES THE NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS, BUT AS IT'S
LO	HAPPENING, UPON THE PRESUBMISSION OR THE PREREVIEW
L1	THAT WE'RE DOING, A NUMBER OF THE APPLICATIONS WERE
L2	NOT ELIGIBLE.
L3	SO THE ACTUAL NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS ARE A
L4	LITTLE OVER TWO X, THE 150 TO 160, THAT WE
L5	ANTICIPATED BASED ON THE LAST DISC-O ROUND. SINCE
L6	WE HAVE THAT METRIC IN PLACE OF TWO TIMES THE NUMBER
L7	OF APPLICATIONS, IT'S REASONABLE TO ANTICIPATE THAT
L8	WE COULD HAVE TWO TIMES THE NUMBER OF AWARDS ROUGHLY
L9	THAT WE COULD JUSTIFY DOUBLING THE BUDGET FOR THAT
20	IN THIS SPECIFIC INSTANCE.
21	I SAY IN THIS SPECIFIC INSTANCE BOTH
22	BECAUSE IT IS THE LAST OF ITS KIND AND BECAUSE THIS,
23	IN THE TEAM'S OPINION, IS NOT MEANT TO BE
24	PRECEDENTIAL GOING FORWARD BECAUSE THE SAF, AS ROSA
25	LAID IT OUT, AND AS WE LIVED IT IN ITS EVOLUTION

1	OVER THE LAST YEAR AND A HALF IS VERY SPECIFIC TO
2	THE TIMING OF THE ADAPTATION TO TECHNOLOGIES THAT
3	COMES ALONG, THE AMOUNT OF MONEY WE FEEL SHOULD BE
4	PUT OUT AS WE PROCEED ALONG IN PURSUING THE VARIOUS
5	GOALS, AND UNDERTAKING THE IMPLEMENTED CONCEPT
6	PLANS, ET CETERA. SO WE WANT TO BE VERY CAREFUL
7	THAT AS A GENERAL MATTER WE DON'T ASSUME THAT
8	BECAUSE WE MIGHT WANT TO DOUBLE THE BUDGET HERE,
9	THAT WE'LL DOUBLE THE BUDGET FOR THE NEXT THING OR
10	TRIPLE THE BUDGET FOR THE THING AFTER THAT BECAUSE
11	IT'S GOING TO IT WILL HAVE CONSEQUENCES WITH
12	RESPECT TO BEING ABLE TO DRIVE THE SAF PROGRAM IN
13	THE WAY THAT WE THINK IS MOST BENEFICIAL TO ACHIEVE
14	THE GREATEST RESULTS, ADVANCE THE MOST PROJECTS TO
15	BLA, ET CETERA. SO WE HAVE TO BE VERY COGNIZANT OF
16	THAT.
17	SO THE TEAM'S VIEW IS THAT WE SHOULD STICK
18	TO THE FISCAL DISCIPLINE; BUT WITH RESPECT TO THIS
19	DISC-O PROPOSAL BY JUDY, GIVEN THE TWO-X METRIC THAT
20	WE HAVE TO HANG OUR HAT ON HERE AND BEING AWARE OF
21	THE CIRCUMSTANCES WHICH ARE UNQUESTIONABLY CHANGED,
22	THERE'S NO DOUBT ABOUT THAT, THAT WE COULD GO ALONG
23	WITH THAT AS A TEAM AS A RECOMMENDATION.
24	GETTING TO PAT'S QUESTION, BECAUSE WE'RE
25	DOING THAT HERE, AGAIN, IN OUR OPINION ONLY, THE

1	BOARD MAKES THE DECISIONS HERE, SHOULD NOT MEAN THAT
2	WE'RE GOING TO BE ADDING MANY MORE MILLION HERE,
3	MANY MORE MILLION THERE. HOWEVER, OF COURSE, THE
4	BOARD CAN REVIEW AND TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION
5	CIRCUMSTANCES AS THEY COME UP. AND IT'S OUR JOB, IF
6	AND WHEN THE BOARD DECIDES TO DO THAT, TO
7	ACCOMMODATE THAT BY ADJUSTING THE MODELS AND THE
8	BUDGETS AND EVERYTHING ELSE.
9	SO THIS ISN'T TO SAY THE BOARD IS CUT OFF
10	FROM ANYTHING. YOU GUYS MAKE THE DECISIONS, BUT WE
11	DO WANT TO BE VERY CAREFUL IN MAKING SURE
12	ADMONISHING EVERYBODY THAT DECISIONS THAT YOU HAVE
13	NOW TO INCREASE BUDGETS, DO WHATEVER, HAVE
14	CONSEQUENCES DOWN THE LINE. WE WANT TO BE IN A
15	POSITION WHERE WE CAN MAXIMALLY ADVANCE THE FIELD.
16	AND REMEMBER SEVERAL YEARS FROM NOW, THE FIELD MOVES
17	SO QUICKLY, THERE ARE GOING TO BE MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS
18	THAT NOBODY CAN ANTICIPATE ON THE SCIENCE SIDE. WHO
19	KNOWS THAT THE NEW CRISPR IS GOING TO BE, FOR
20	EXAMPLE, OR THE NEW IPS CELLS OR WHATEVER. SOMEBODY
21	IS GOING TO COME UP WITH SOMETHING REALLY
22	REVOLUTIONARY. WE WANT TO BE IN A POSITION WHERE WE
23	HAVE MONEY TO FUND THAT. SO IT'S IMPORTANT TO KEEP
24	ALL OF THAT IN CONTEXT GOING FORWARD.
25	BUT, PAT, THE ANSWER IS, OF COURSE, YOU

1	HAVE FLEXIBILITY IN SHORT.
2	DR. LEVITT: YEAH. I'M GLAD YOU ADDED
3	THAT LAST PHRASE, IN SHORT. I DON'T ACTUALLY KNOW
4	WHAT MEANS EXCEPT IT CAN'T BE GOOD. I'M NOT TALKING
5	ABOUT FLEXIBILITY NOW IN TERMS OF THIS. I
6	UNDERSTAND SETTING THE BUDGETS WITHIN THESE
7	CATEGORIES MAKES SENSE. BUT WHEN YOU SEE WITHIN A
8	CATEGORY 70 PERCENT OF THE SUBMITTED GRANTS ARE
9	GETTING FUNDED AND ANOTHER CATEGORY 5 PERCENT ARE
10	GETTING FUNDED, THAT'S TROUBLING TO ME TO SORT OF
11	THINK ABOUT HOW TO DEAL WITH THAT. IT CAN'T BE THAT
12	ONE CATEGORY IS GETTING THE BEST GRANTS AND THE
13	OTHER CATEGORY IS NOT.
14	I DON'T HAVE A SOLUTION. I'M TALKING
15	ABOUT BEING FLEXIBLE WITHIN THE CONTEXT OF THIS
16	COMING UP DURING OUR MEETINGS WHERE WE HAVE TO MAKE
17	SPLIT-SECOND DECISIONS EVEN IF WE READ AHEAD OF TIME
18	ABOUT, OKAY, SO THIS IS WHAT'S RECOMMENDED. WE'RE
19	GOING TO GO ALONG AND DO IT. I THINK THAT THAT'S
20	FINE. AND WE'VE DONE THAT ALMOST A HUNDRED PERCENT
21	OF THE TIME. BUT WHEN SOMETHING LIKE THIS COMES UP
22	WHERE YOU'VE GOT ONE CATEGORY WITH MASSIVE SUCCESS
23	AND ANOTHER WITH VERY LOW SUCCESS, HOW IS THE BOARD
24	GOING TO DEAL WITH THAT IN REAL-TIME? I DON'T KNOW
25	THE ANSWER TO THAT BECAUSE I DON'T KNOW THE BYLAWS

1	WELL. THAT'S MY FAULT. AND I DON'T KNOW AMENDMENTS
2	THAT CAN BE INTRODUCED. AND AT ONE OF THE MEETINGS
3	WE HAD MARK INTRODUCED AMENDMENTS TO DEAL WITH
4	SOMETHING THAT APPARENTLY HAD SOME FLEXIBILITY.
5	SO I WOULD JUST LIKE REASSURANCE THAT
6	THERE IS FLEXIBILITY, THAT WHEN THINGS COME UP AT A
7	BOARD MEETING WHEN WE'RE MAKING REALLY
8	MINUTE-BY-MINUTE DECISIONS ABOUT WHAT'S GOING TO GET
9	FUNDED, WE HAVE ABILITY TO SORT OF SAY CAN WE PAUSE
10	FOR A MINUTE AND TALK ABOUT THIS, RIGHT, AND THEN
11	USE WHATEVER WE'RE ALLOWED TO USE FROM A RULE

19	THERE WAS A DELAY IN THE DISC-O ROUND DUE TO THE
20	FIRES POSTPONING. I KNOW WHAT YOU ARE GETTING AT,
21	BUT IT WASN'T LIKE THERE WAS 41 MILLION WE COULD
22	HAVE APPLIED TO WHAT YOU'RE TALKING ABOUT THAT WAS
23	ALLOCATED TO THAT. IT WASN'T. IT WAS ALLOCATED TO

25	DR. LEVITT: THAT'S THE POINT OF

5	CASH SURVEYS, WHO NEEDS WHAT FOR WHAT. WHAT'S THE
6	LONG-TERM BUDGET? SHE'S DOING A LOT OF WORK TO HELP
7	GUIDE YOU GUYS ON DECISIONS. AND AS WE ADJUST THESE
8	THINGS, AGAIN, THERE ARE CONSEQUENCES. IT WILL

20	OUR NEXT CATEGORY IS THE CIRM DIRECT GRANT

23	85.3 REMAINING.
24	FOR ACCESS AND AFFORDABILITY WE HAVE SPENT

1	ON GRANT ADMINISTRATION, WE HAVE SPENT
2	23.1 MILLION, AND WE HAVE 141.9 MILLION REMAINING.
3	OUR LAST CATEGORY WOULD BE THE CIRM
4	ADMINISTRATION, AND WE HAVE SPENT 35 MILLION TO
5	DATE, AND WE HAVE 157.5 MILLION REMAINING.
6	NOW WE WILL GO OVER THE 24/25 FINANCIAL

25	CURRENTLY AT 62. WE ARE ALSO IN THE HIRING PROCESS

1	OF FOUR NEW STAFF FOR THIS CURRENT BUDGET YEAR.
2	THESE ARE THE PROJECTED FINANCIAL RESULTS
3	FOR THE 24/25 FISCAL YEAR. IN THE FIRST COLUMN YOU
4	WILL SEE THAT THESE ARE THE CATEGORIES THAT WE
5	BUDGET. IN THE SECOND COLUMN, OUR BUDGET FOR THE
6	24/25 FISCAL YEAR WAS 31.6 MILLION. OUR ESTIMATED
7	RESULTS FOR THE 24/25 FISCAL YEAR IS 25 MILLION.
8	THESE NUMBERS CAN CHANGE AS WE ARE STILL HIRING, SO
9	WE MAY HAVE INCREASED EMPLOYEE EXPENSES. THAT
10	PROVIDES A VARIANCE OF 6.5 MILLION.
11	THESE ARE SOME OF THE DRIVERS OF THE
12	BUDGET VARIANCE FOR THE 24/25 FISCAL YEAR. THERE
13	WERE POSITION VACANCIES. AND EVEN THOUGH IN THE
14	PREVIOUS SLIDE WE DISCUSSED THAT WE HAVE FILLED 12
15	POSITIONS, MOST OF THOSE OCCURRED DURING THE SECOND
16	HALF OF THE YEAR, AND THAT RESULTED IN A SALARY
17	SAVINGS.
18	THERE WAS A FOCUS ON STRATEGIC ALLOCATION
19	FRAMEWORK AND INTERNAL OPERATIONS, AND THAT LED TO A
20	DECREASE IN TRAVEL AND TRAINING.
21	OUR EXTERNAL SERVICES ALSO DECREASED DUE
22	TO THE REORGANIZATION OF DEPARTMENTS AND PRIORITIES
23	LEADING TO A DECREASE IN THE ENGAGEMENT OF EXTERNAL
24	SERVICES.
25	OUR REVIEWS, MEETINGS, AND WORKSHOPS ALSO

1	DECREASED, AND THAT'S BECAUSE THE APPLICATION CYCLE
2	WAS PAUSED, AND THAT RESULTED IN A DECREASE IN THE
3	GWG REVIEWS FOR THE YEAR.
4	NOW WE'LL GO OVER THE PROPOSED BUDGET FOR
5	THE 25/26 YEAR. NORMALLY YOU WOULD SEE THE
6	COMPARISON OF THE ESTIMATED TO FINISH OF THE PRIOR
7	YEAR TO THE NEW BUDGET. HOWEVER, GIVEN THE UNIQUE
8	YEAR THAT I JUST DESCRIBED, THE DECISION WAS MADE TO
9	SHOW THE COMPARISON AS BUDGET TO BUDGET AS IT GIVES
10	A BETTER PICTURE OF THE YEAR-TO-YEAR BREAKDOWN.
11	SO IN THE FIRST COLUMN WE HAVE THE
12	CATEGORIES OUR BUDGET CATEGORIES. IN THE SECOND
13	COLUMN WAS OUR APPROVED 24/25 BUDGET, WHICH WAS 31.6
14	MILLION. OUR PROPOSED BUDGET FOR THE 25/26 FISCAL
15	YEAR IS 34.6 MILLION. THIS IS AN INCREASE OF \$3
16	MILLION. AND I WILL GO OVER THAT IN THE NEXT SLIDE.
17	THESE ARE THE MAJOR DRIVERS OF THE 25/26
18	ADMINISTRATION BUDGET. WE HAVE EXTERNAL SERVICES.
19	THERE'S GOING TO BE AN INCREASED USE OF POTENTIAL
20	INCREASED USE OF LEGAL SERVICES AS THE AGENCY GROWS
21	AND WE INCREASE GRANT AWARDS.
22	THERE'S AN INVESTMENT IN GRANT AWARD
23	INFRASTRUCTURE SUCH AS DATA PLATFORMS, EDUCATIONAL
24	OUTREACH, AND THE IPSC CELL BANK REPOSITORY
25	MAINTENANCE. THERE IS ALSO AN INCREASE IN

1	I.TRELATED CONTRACTS DUE TO INFLATION AND
2	POTENTIAL TARIFFS.
3	OUR MEMBERSHIPS AND TRAINING WILL ALSO
4	INCREASE DUE TO LARGER STAFFING LEVELS. AND OUR
5	TRAINING BUDGET IS BUDGETED AT 1 PERCENT OF THE
6	LABOR COST. SO AN INCREASE IN LABOR COST WILL
7	INCREASE THE TRAINING BUDGET.
8	NOW, WE DO HAVE I WANTED TO POINT OUT
9	THAT WE ACTUALLY ANTICIPATE A DECREASE IN THREE
10	AREAS. SO THAT WAS WITH A FOCUS ON MINDFUL
11	PLANNING. OUR REVIEWS, MEETINGS, AND WORKSHOPS, THE
12	GWG REVIEWS ARE PLANNED TO START LATER IN THE YEAR
13	FOR THIS YEAR ONLY. THAT'S WHY THERE IS A DECREASE
14	IN OUR REVIEWS BUDGET.
15	TRAVEL IS BEING PLANNED STRATEGICALLY,
16	LIMITING THE NUMBER OF TRAVELERS AND OUT-OF-STATE
17	TRAVEL.
18	THERE WILL ALSO BE A DECREASE IN
19	EQUIPMENT, SUPPLIES, ET CETERA, SOFTWARE JUST IN
20	ANTICIPATION OF A MINDFUL PLANNING.
21	AS FAR AS OUR INCREASE IN EMPLOYEE
22	EXPENSES, THESE ARE THE MAJOR DRIVERS. SO WE ARE
23	REQUESTING THREE NEW POSITIONS AND FIVE PROMOTIONS
24	WHICH WOULD INCREASE BY \$783,850. THERE IS ALSO A
25	PROPOSAL FOR A PERFORMANCE-BASED MERIT SALARY

1	INCREASE OF 3 PERCENT FOR ELIGIBLE STAFF AND A
2	3-PERCENT COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENT. I JUST WANTED
3	TO POINT OUT THAT THE \$944,150 IS SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT
4	FROM THE POSTED AMOUNT. THERE WAS A SLIGHT CHANGE
5	IN THE FIGURES. THIS COST OF LIVING INCREASE
6	INCLUDES THE STAFF AS WELL AS THE PRESIDENT, CHAIR,
7	AND VICE CHAIR.
8	WE HAVE ALSO ADDED A LEAVE BUYOUT FOR
9	EMPLOYEES WHO LEAVE OR RETIRE. THIS IS A CASH-OUT
10	OF ALLOWABLE LEAVE TIME. THAT IS A LITTLE OVER A
11	MILLION DOLLARS. I JUST WANTED TO POINT OUT THIS IS
12	NEW. ALL STAFF RECEIVE VACATION HOURS THAT ARE
13	CONSIDERED THEIR PROPERTY. THIS IS A LIABILITY FOR
14	US AS WE ARE REQUIRED TO CASH OUT THOSE HOURS SHOULD
15	THEY DECIDE TO LEAVE CIRM. THIS RESERVES AN AMOUNT
16	EQUAL TO ONE STAFF MEMBER FROM EACH COST CENTER AS
17	WE CANNOT PREDICT WHO WILL LEAVE. THIS ALLOWS THE
18	COST CENTERS TO BACKFILL THEIR POSITIONS WITHOUT
19	IMPACTING THEIR BUDGETS. AND WE DO HAVE ONE
20	CONFIRMED RETIREMENT THIS YEAR.
21	THESE ARE THE RISK FACTORS FOR THE 25/26
22	BUDGET. WHILE CIRM CONTINUES TO ACTIVELY MANAGE
23	COSTS, HOWEVER SOME FACTORS ARE DIFFICULT TO
24	CONTROL. THERE IS ALWAYS RECRUITMENT AND PERSONNEL
25	GROWTH, AND THERE IS ALSO THE INCREASED COST OF

1	GOODS AND SERVICES DUE TO INFLATION AND TARIFFS.
2	AT THIS POINT WE REQUEST TO RECOMMEND
3	THE SUBCOMMITTEE TO RECOMMEND APPROVAL TO THE BOARD
4	FOR THE 25/26 ADMINISTRATION BUDGET.
5	DR. BLUMENTHAL: GOOD. THANK YOU,

10	CELL LINES, WE ARE BOUND TO THE IP HOLDERS WHICH ARE
11	MANAGED BY FCDI IN TERMS OF MTA'S THAT ARE NEEDED
12	FOR DISTRIBUTING THE CELLS AND THE LICENSES FOR
13	COMMERCIAL ACTIVITIES.
14	AND ALSO, WE WERE NOT GOING TO CHARGE A
15	NEW BANK MANAGER FOR THE CELLS, BUT WE WOULD HAVE TO
16	PAY THEM TO RECEIVE, STORE, AND DISTRIBUTE THE
17	CELLS. SO WE LOOKED INTO ALL THAT. THIS WAS

24	NIH USES. AND SETTING UP A NEW BANK WOULD HAVE
25	INCURRED, AS I MENTIONED, A LARGE TRANSFER COST,

1	SHIPPING THE CELLS AND SELLING FEES. AND ONCE THE
2	NEW BANKING LOCATION COULD HAVE BEEN ESTABLISHED,
3	RELATIVE LARGE ANNUAL COST COULD HAVE BEEN INCURRED
4	FOR STORING THE CELLS AND DISTRIBUTING THE CELLS,
5	REQUIRING FTE'S, COMPLETING MTA'S, SHIPPING THE
6	CELLS. AND BASED ON HISTORICAL SALES DATA THAT WE
7	HAVE, THE REVENUE COULD NOT COVER THIS COST. AND,
8	AS I MENTIONED, BETWEEN THREE AND \$400,000 A YEAR

14	THE LABS, AS MANY AS POSSIBLE, BEFORE THE BANK
15	CLOSES. AND WE WILL STORE USING THIS THIRD PARTY IN
16	COORDINATION WITH FCDI TWO VIALS OF CELLS OF EACH OF
17	THE CIRM IPS CELL LINES. SO THE BANK OR PARTS OF IT

23	TODAY. THIS POLICY REVISION BEGAN OVER NINE MONTHS
24	AGO AND INVOLVED MEMBERS ACROSS THE ENTIRE CIRM TEAM
25	FROM GRANTS MANAGEMENT TO LEGAL TO BOARD GOVERNANCE

1	TO PROGRAM TO REVIEW. AND IN PARTICULAR I WANT TO
2	ACKNOWLEDGE THE DEDICATED TEAM WHO WEEKLY SPENT TIME
3	ON THIS POLICY, WHICH INCLUDES OUR GENERAL COUNSEL,
4	RAFAEL AGUIRRE-SACASA; DOUG KEARNEY, OUR DIRECTOR OF
5	GRANTS MANAGEMENT; DEPUTY GENERAL COUNSEL, BEN
6	HUANG, AND OUR PROJECT MANAGER HUGHES. AND DOUG AND
7	RAFAEL ARE JOINING ME TODAY. AND LAST, BUT NOT
8	LEAST, SCOTT TOCHER, WHO IS OUR OFFICE OF
9	ADMINISTRATIVE LAW EXPERT, WHO YOU WILL BE HEARING
10	FROM TODAY AS WELL.
11	SO THIS TEAMWORK HAS RESULTED IN THE
12	POLICY REVISIONS PROPOSED IN TODAY'S MATERIALS WHICH
13	INCLUDED THE DRAFT POLICY, THE REDLINE ON THESE
14	CHANGES AGAINST OUR CURRENT GRANTS ADMINISTRATION
15	POLICY, AND AN ACCOMPANYING MEMO SUMMARIZING THE
16	CHANGES. AND MY PRESENTATION TODAY WILL PRESENT THE
17	HIGH LEVEL CHANGES ALONG WITH THE BACKGROUND AND THE
18	APPROVAL PROCESS.
19	SO FIRST I WANTED TO GIVE SOME BACKGROUND.
20	THE GRANTS ADMINISTRATION POLICY IS A SET OF
21	REGULATIONS THAT GOVERN THE MANAGEMENT OF CIRM
22	AWARDS. THE FIRST GRANTS ADMINISTRATION POLICY WAS
23	ADOPTED BY THE ICOC IN 2006 AND WAS DEFINED IN TWO
24	CATEGORIES OF ORGANIZATION TYPES, SO FOR-PROFIT AND
25	NON-PROFIT.

IN 2008 THE ICOC ADOPTED A GRANTS
ADMINISTRATION POLICY SPECIFICALLY FOR FACILITIES
AND EQUIPMENT GRANTS. THIS WAS IN RESPONSE TO TWO
PROGRAMS IN PROP 71, WHICH IS THE MAJOR FACILITIES
AND THE SHARED LABS PROGRAMS.
IN 2016 THE ICOC ADOPTED OUR CURRENT
ACTIVE GRANTS ADMINISTRATION POLICIES WHICH ARE
DEFINED IN TWO CATEGORIES, BY CLINICAL TRIAL STAGE
PROJECTS AND BY DISCOVERY, TRANSLATION, AND
EDUCATION PROJECTS.
SINCE THIS IS A REGULATION, A CALIFORNIA
STATE REGULATION, CIRM, AS ANY STATE AGENCY, MUST
FOLLOW THE CALIFORNIA OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATIVE LAW
PROCESS FOR CREATING ANY NEW REGULATION. AND SO I'D
LIKE TO HAND IT OVER BRIEFLY TO SCOTT TOCHER TO WALK
THIS SUBCOMMITTEE THROUGH THAT PROCESS THAT THIS
RECOMMENDATION TODAY WOULD KICK OFF.
MR. TOCHER: SURE, JENN. THANKS. YOU
KNOW YOU'VE MADE GREAT CAREER MOVES WHEN YOU'RE

23	RATIONALE FOR THAT GOES BACK TO CONSISTENCY. IN OUR
24	PREVIOUS POLICY, WE USED AWARD AND GRANT
25	INTERCHANGEABLY, AND WE WANTED TO FOCUS ON ONE CLEAR

1	STATEMENT OF AWARD.
2	SO I'LL START TO REVIEW THE HIGHLIGHTS OF
3	THE CHANGES WITH THIS NEW POLICY. THE FIRST IS
4	DEFINITIONS AND TERMINOLOGY. SO THE FIRST IS THAT
5	WE INTRODUCED A NEW TERM IN THIS PROPOSED POLICY
6	WHICH IS A CRITICAL ROLE. A CRITICAL ROLE IS A
7	SUBSET OF WHAT WE CALL KEY PERSONNEL IN OUR
8	APPLICATIONS, IN OUR GRANTS AND AWARDS THAT HAVE A
9	MINIMUM EFFORT REQUIREMENT AS DESCRIBED IN THE

7	PARTICULAR REQUIREMENTS IN THE PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT.
8	THE NEXT SECTION THAT HAS BEEN UPDATED IS
9	THE APPLICATION REVIEW SECTION. THIS SECTION
10	REMOVES TERMS ASSOCIATED WITH APPLICATION BUDGET
11	REVIEW PROCESS AND SCORING CRITERIA SECTION. THESE
12	HAVE NOT BEEN REMOVED FROM OUR PROCESSES, BUT THEY
13	WERE DUPLICATIVE IN NATURE AS THEY WERE ALREADY
14	SPECIFIED IN OTHER KEY DOCUMENTS, SUCH AS THE
15	PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT OR GWG BYLAWS OR CONCEPT PLANS
16	THAT ARE BROUGHT TO THE ICOC.
17	AND LASTLY, THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS
18	SECTION HAS BEEN ADJUSTED, WHICH HAS ADDED A
19	SPECIFIC REQUIREMENT TO ACKNOWLEDGE CIRM IN ANY
20	PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS, SUCH AS PRESS RELEASES,
21	PUBLICATION CONFERENCE PRESENTATIONS, ET CETERA.
22	THE REASON FOR SPECIFYING THIS IS IT
23	ALLOWS ALL THE FAILURE OF COMPLIANCE TERMS AND
24	CONDITIONS IN THIS POLICY TO APPLY NOW TO THIS
25	REQUIREMENT.

1	AND LASTLY, IN OUR TERMS AND CONDITIONS,
2	WE UPDATED OUR LOAN CONVERSION SECTION. SO THE
3	CURRENT POLICY CONTAINS OUTDATED LIBOR LOAN
4	CONVERSION RATES AS LIBOR NO LONGER EXISTS. AND
5	THIS WAS REPLACED BY THE SECURED OVERNIGHT FINANCING
6	RATE OR SOFR.
7	THE NEXT SET OF CHANGES ARE BUCKETED IN
8	ALLOWABLE AND UNALLOWABLE COSTS. THE CURRENT GRANTS
9	ADMINISTRATION POLICY SPECIFIES THE MAXIMUM SALARY
10	THAT AWARD PERSONNEL CAN CHARGE TO A CIRM AWARD.
11	THIS IS BASED ON THE CALIFORNIA CONSUMER PRICE INDEX
12	WITH A SPECIFIED CALCULATION IN THE POLICY. THIS
13	PROPOSED POLICY ALIGNS WITH THE UCOP HEALTH SCIENCES
14	COMPENSATION PLAN. AS CIRM CAME TO THE BOARD, I
15	BELIEVE IT WAS ABOUT A YEAR AGO IN MARCH, TO ALIGN
16	OUR POST-DOCS AND PRE-DOCS TO UCOP COMPENSATION
17	PLAN, WE WOULD ALSO THINK IT MAKES SENSE TO ALIGN
18	THE SALARIED PERSONNEL ON A PROJECT TO THAT AS WELL.
19	AND WHAT WE LEARNED FROM THAT ACTUALLY IS
20	UCOP USES THAT RATE ALREADY AND USES CALIFORNIA

24	REGARDING THE CLOSEOUT OF AWARDS WHICH SPECIFY THAT
25	TERMINATED AWARDS MUST RELINQUISH THE UNOBLIGATED

1	BALANCE OWED BY CIRM IF FINAL REPORTING IS NOT
2	RECEIVED WITH 120 DAYS. AND THAT CLOSED AWARDS
3	CANNOT REQUEST A REVISION TO FINANCIAL REPORTING
4	AFTER SIX MONTHS AFTER THE AWARD DATE.
5	AND THEN LASTLY, THE LAST CHANGES SPECIFY

17	POLICY LIMITS FOR MENTOR-TO-TRAINEE RATIOS AND ALLOW
18	THE SPECIFIC PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT AND RFA TO SPECIFY
19	THOSE RATIOS. CURRENTLY THERE ARE LIMITS IN THE
20	GRANTS ADMINISTRATION POLICY, AND WE BELIEVE THAT

8	SITES. THAT HAS NOT BEEN SPECIFIED IN THIS POLICY
