21	VERY IMPORTANT POINTS THAT WERE MADE BY THE BOARD
22	MEMBERS.
23	POUNEH OUTLINED WHAT WE USE AS OUR
24	APPROACH TO BUDGETING. AND BY DESIGN IT IS INTENDED
25	TO PROVIDE FOR A BUDGET THAT WOULD ALLOW THE BOARD

1	TO FUND ALL PROJECTS IF THEY MET THE QUALITY AND
2	RIGOR STANDARDS OF OUR GWG, ASSUMING THAT WE HAD THE
3	MAXIMUM PERFORMANCE FOR CLINICAL AWARDS AND AVERAGE
4	PERFORMANCE BASED ON BENCHMARK PAST PERFORMANCE.
5	AND SO IN THE PAST YEAR, THAT DEFINITELY
6	WAS AN OVERSHOOT IN THE RELAUNCH, AND ALSO WE ARE
7	ALSO IN THE MIDST OF INSTITUTING VARIOUS CONCEPT
8	CHANGES THAT THE BOARD RECENTLY APPROVED IN TERMS OF
9	EXPANDING SOME SCOPE AND THE TYPES OF AWARDS THAT
10	CAN BE BROUGHT IN. SO WE HAD DECIDED TO STAY WITH
11	THAT FORMULA. AND, OF COURSE, THE BOARD CAN ALWAYS
12	ASK OR THE COMMITTEE CAN ASK US TO CHANGE OUR
13	APPROACH, BUT WE DECIDED TO STAY WITH THAT APPROACH
14	BECAUSE WE DO EXPECT AN INCREASE IN APPLICATIONS
15	THAT WILL MEET KIND OF THE PROJECTIONS BASED ON PAST
16	PERFORMANCE.
17	THE REASON WHY WE WOULD EXPECT AN INCREASE
18	IS, NO. 1, THE INCREASE IN SCOPE INCLUDING GENE
19	THERAPIES AND GENETIC RESEARCH, THE EXPANDED SCOPE
20	THAT WAS BROUGHT TO THIS BOARD AND APPROVED.
21	SECONDLY, BASED ON WHAT WE ARE SEEING OUT
22	IN THE WORLD AS WE ARE BACK OUT THERE IN THE
23	CONFERENCES AND INTERACTIONS WITH POTENTIAL
24	INVESTIGATORS AND VERY PROMISING SCIENCE THAT'S OUT
25	THERE.

1	AND, THIRDLY, THE WAY THINGS ARE GOING NOW
2	IN TERMS OF THE BIOPHARMA AND REGENERATIVE MEDICINE
3	MARKET RIGHT NOW, WHAT'S HAPPENING IS THERE'S A
4	READJUSTMENT, AND WE ARE SEEING THAT THE FUNDING FOR
5	VERY PROMISING PROGRAMS ARE NOT AS AVAILABLE AS THEY
6	HAVE BEEN BECAUSE ESSENTIALLY THERE WAS A PERCEIVED
7	OVERVALUATION OF THE MARKET AND NOW IT'S
8	READJUSTING. SO THERE WILL BE KIND OF A DEMAND FOR
9	TRANSLATIONAL, FOR INSTANCE, SPECIFICALLY FOR
10	TRANSLATIONAL AND CLINICAL PROGRAMS.
11	SO WE CAN, OF COURSE, ALWAYS ADJUST
12	ACCORDING TO THE BOARD'S RECOMMENDATION THAT WE
13	CHANGE OUR APPROACH TO THE FORECAST TO BE ON THE
14	MORE CONSERVATIVE SIDE, MEANING ASK FOR LESS. AND,
15	OF COURSE, IN THAT CASE, IF THERE ARE PROGRAMS THAT
16	ARE PROPOSED BY THE GWG AS HIGHLY MERITORIOUS AND
17	WORTHWHILE FUNDING AND WE DON'T HAVE THE FUNDS FOR
18	IT, THE BOARD CAN THEN DO THAT, BUT THAT WOULD
19	REQUIRE A PROCESS FOR BRINGING THE BOARD TOGETHER
20	AGAIN AND WOULD, THEREFORE, DELAY THE GRANTS FOR
21	THESE PROGRAMS THAT ARE CONSIDERED MERITORIOUS. SO
22	THAT'S ABSOLUTELY UP TO YOU, BUT I JUST WANTED TO
23	EXPLAIN THE PROCESS WE WENT THROUGH TO GET TO THIS
24	PROGRAM.
25	AS YOU CAN SEE, THE PROPOSED BUDGET FOR

1	22/23 IS ACTUALLY LOWER THAN THE PROPOSED BUDGET FOR
2	21/22, BUT STILL, BASED ON A PROJECTION THAT'S
3	TAKING A MORE, I WOULD SAY, HEADING MORE TOWARDS
4	HAVING ENOUGH FUNDS RATHER THAN TRYING TO CONSERVE
5	BECAUSE WHEN FUNDS ARE NOT EXPENDED, THEY'RE NOT
6	LOST. THEY GO BACK INTO THE RESEARCH BUDGET SO THEY
7	CAN BE DEPLOYED FOR UPCOMING YEARS. AND SO THAT IS
8	SOMETHING THAT IT'S NOT AS IF WE NOW LOSE ACCESS TO
9	IT TO BE ABLE TO FUND THE PROGRAMS.
10	SO, DR. MELMED, IF YOU HAVE ANY OTHER
11	QUESTIONS, I JUST WANTED TO GIVE YOU KIND OF A
12	BACKGROUND FOR WHY WE CHOSE THIS APPROACH.
13	DR. MELMED: I UNDERSTAND, BUT I'M NOT
14	SURE I CONCUR, BUT I UNDERSTAND WHAT YOUR APPROACH
15	IS. I WOULD MUCH RATHER YOU CAME BACK TO THE BOARD
16	AND ASKED FOR MORE MONEY FOR A VERY HIGHLY
17	MERITORIOUS GRANT FOR WHICH THERE WAS NOT SUFFICIENT
18	MONEY. I'M VERY NERVOUS, NOT NERVOUS, I'M ANXIOUS
19	THAT THIS WILL GIVE THE PERCEPTION THAT THERE'S A
20	POT OF MONEY AND JUST STICK YOUR FINGER IN AND
21	YOU'LL GET IT.
22	DR. YAMAMOTO: IN THAT REGARD, CAN YOU SAY
23	SOMETHING ABOUT THE SUCCESS RATE APPLICATIONS IN THE
24	THREE PROGRAMS, THREE RESEARCH PROGRAMS? I'M SURE
25	YOU'RE TURNING AWAY SOME GRANT APPLICATIONS THAT

1	COME IN THAT ARE NONMERITORIOUS. AND WHAT WE ARE
2	SAYING WHAT YOU'RE SAYING IS THAT YOU TRIED TO
3	SET THE BUDGET SO THAT YOU CAN FUND ALL MERITORIOUS
4	PROGRAMS. AND KIND OF A BAD OPTICS HERE IS THAT THE
5	IMPLICATION IS THAT THERE WEREN'T PROGRAMS THAT WERE
6	SUFFICIENTLY MERITORIOUS TO SPEND ALL THE MONEY THAT
7	WE SET. AND THAT WOULD BE AN ARGUMENT FOR TAKING
8	SHLOMO'S APPROACH OF HAVING TO GO BACK TO THE BOARD
9	AND SAY, "WE ARE OVERRUN WITH FANTASTIC PROGRAMS.
10	CAN WE HAVE SOME MORE MONEY?"
11	DR. MILLAN: DR. YAMAMOTO, THANK YOU FOR
12	THAT QUESTION. I'LL DEFER TO DR. SAMBRANO WHO'S ON
13	THE CALL TO TALK ABOUT WHAT THE PERFORMANCE HAS BEEN
14	IN TERMS OF THE NUMBER OF RECOMMENDED PROGRAMS
15	VERSUS WHAT COMES IN FOR THE VARIOUS PILLARS. WE DO
16	TAKE THAT INTO ACCOUNT. THAT IS PART OF WHAT WE USE
17	IN THE PROJECTIONS. AND IF WE SEE THAT THERE HAS
18	BEEN A TREND DOWN, WE ADJUST FOR THAT. BUT I'LL LET
19	DR. SAMBRANO SPEAK TO THAT.
20	BUT I WANTED TO SAY THAT THE GWG PROCESS
21	IS BY NATURE DESIGNED TO BE AN EXTREMELY RIGOROUS
22	PROCESS. IT IS NOT ADJUSTED BASED ON THE AMOUNT
23	THAT'S AVAILABLE. THE GWG IS INSTRUCTED TO PUT
24	THESE PROGRAMS THROUGH A VERY RIGOROUS PROCESS BASED
25	ON SCIENTIFIC MERIT AND ALL OF THE REVIEW CRITERIA

1	THAT ARE OUTLINED. AND SO THAT'S INDEPENDENT OF HOW
2	MUCH IS AVAILABLE. SO THEIR RECOMMENDATIONS ARE NOT
3	ADJUSTED UPWARD OR DOWNWARD BASED ON AVAILABLE
4	FUNDS. I JUST WANTED TO MAKE THAT DISTINCTION.
5	SO THE REASON THAT WE TAKE THIS APPROACH
6	IS REALLY FOR THE BOARD. SO THE BOARD ALWAYS
7	HAS CAN ASK US TO CHANGE OUR APPROACH IN TERMS OF
8	HOW WE BUDGET FOR SURE. BUT JUST TO RESPOND BECAUSE
9	I DO WANT TO RESPOND TO THAT QUESTION, I THINK DR.
10	SAMBRANO IS ON AND HE CAN SPEAK TO WHAT THE
11	PERFORMANCE HAS BEEN OF THE VARIOUS PROGRAMS THAT
12	YOU SEE HERE. DR. SAMBRANO.
13	DR. SAMBRANO: I CAN GIVE YOU THE
14	APPROXIMATE PERCENTAGE SUCCESS RATE FOR EACH OF THE
15	PROGRAMS. SO FOR DISCOVERY, WE TEND TO GET A LOT OF
16	APPLICATIONS FOR THOSE ROUNDS. SO THE SUCCESS RATE
17	IS ABOUT 17 TO 18 PERCENT. FOR THE TRANSLATIONAL
18	PROGRAM, IT'S ABOUT 25 PERCENT. AND FOR THE
19	CLINICAL PROGRAM, IT'S ABOUT 50 PERCENT, USUALLY
20	REQUIRING MOST APPLICANTS THAT DO SUCCEED TO COME IN
21	WITH REVISED APPLICATIONS.
22	FOR EDUCATION, THE PERCENTAGE IS MUCH
23	HIGHER. IT CAN BE 80 TO 100 PERCENT JUST BECAUSE
24	THOSE PROGRAMS TEND TO HAVE MORE OF A GENEROUS
25	OVERALL BUDGET, AND THE NUMBER OF APPLICATIONS IS

1	RELATIVELY LOW. SO THAT IS AN APPROXIMATION OF WHAT
2	WE HAVE.
3	CHAIRMAN GOLDSTEIN: I'LL JUST NOTE THAT
4	THIS IS IT'S DIFFERENT THAN THE NIH APPROACH
5	WHERE THEY FUND BASED ON HOW MUCH MONEY THEY HAVE
6	RATHER THAN ON TRYING TO MEASURE SOME ABSOLUTE LEVEL
7	OF QUALITY. THEY'RE DIFFERENT APPROACHES. IT SEEMS
8	TO ME THEY'RE BOTH MERITORIOUS. I DON'T KNOW THAT I
9	SEE A PROBLEM.
10	J.T., DO YOU WANT TO JOIN IN THIS DEBATE?
11	CHAIRMAN THOMAS: I JUST WANT TO RESPOND
12	TO SHLOMO'S POINT TO NOTE THAT THE FACT THAT WE HAVE
13	EXCESS AT THE END OF THE YEAR DOES NOT IN ANY WAY
14	MEAN WE ARE COMPROMISING A SINGLE IOTA ON QUALITY
15	WHEN IT COMES TO THE PROJECTS THAT EITHER THIS IS
16	FURTHER TO MARIA'S POINT EITHER THE GWG
17	RECOMMENDS OR THE BOARD APPROVES. YOU CAN GO BACK
18	OVER ANY YEAR WHERE WE HAD A SURPLUS AT THE END OF
19	THE YEAR, AND YOU WILL NOT FIND A PROJECT THAT WAS
20	RECOMMENDED AND APPROVED THAT BETWEEN THE GWG AND
21	THE BOARD WE DIDN'T THINK WAS HIGHLY MERITORIOUS.
22	SO I DON'T WANT ANYBODY TO GET THE IMPRESSION THAT
23	WE ARE COMPROMISING IN THE SLIGHTEST ON THE QUALITY
24	OF THE PROJECTS THAT WE ACTUALLY APPROVE.
25	AND IN POINT OF THE FACT, THE FACT THAT

1	THERE IS A SURPLUS SPEAKS TO THAT POINT. WE ARE NOT
2	TRYING TO MANAGE TO WHAT WE BUDGETED HERE AT ALL.
3	IT'S A BIT OF AN INEXACT SCIENCE FOR THE TEAM TO
4	COME UP WITH THE NUMBER THAT IT'S PROPOSING, AND I
5	THINK THAT BY AND LARGE WE'VE DONE A VERY GOOD JOB.
6	AND YEAR TO YEAR THERE ARE DIFFERENT FACTORS THAT
7	ENTER INTO THE VARIANCE OF WHAT WAS APPROVED AND
8	WHAT WAS ACTUALLY SPENT. BUT, AGAIN, WE ARE NOT
9	SACRIFICING THE SLIGHTEST IN QUALITY. SO I DON'T
10	WANT ANYBODY TO GET THAT IMPRESSION THAT MIGHT BE
11	LISTENING.
12	DR. MELMED: J.T., WITH RESPECT, I
13	CERTAINLY GET THAT, AND I AGREE WITH YOU. I'M NOT
14	SAYING WE ARE SACRIFICING. I DON'T THINK WE ARE AT
15	ALL.
16	FOR EXAMPLE, WHEN WE GET PROPOSALS TO
17	APPROVE IN A CERTAIN CATEGORY, WE ARE ALWAYS TOLD
18	HOW MUCH MONEY IS AVAILABLE.
19	CHAIRMAN THOMAS: YES.
20	DR. MELMED: AND BY KNOWING THAT NUMBER,
21	HOW MUCH MONEY IS AVAILABLE, WE ARE SUBCONSCIOUSLY
22	SAYING, WELL, THERE IS MONEY, SO LET'S FUND ANOTHER
23	GRANT IF IT COMES UP ON THE BORDERLINE. IF WE NEVER
24	KNEW THAT THERE WAS MORE MONEY AVAILABLE, I DON'T
25	KNOW HOW THAT WOULD INFLUENCE OUR SUBJECTIVE

1	THINKING. I JUST DON'T KNOW.
2	I THINK YOU'RE ABSOLUTELY RIGHT IN TERMS
3	OF QUALITY. I DON'T THINK WE ARE COMPROMISING
4	QUALITY; BUT TO KEITH'S POINT, THE OPTICS ARE THAT
5	WE HAVE MORE MONEY THAN WE ARE USING.
6	DR. YAMAMOTO: I THINK THE WAY THAT MARIA
7	AND J.T., BOTH OF YOU, HAVE ENUNCIATED THE KIND OF
8	RIGOR WITH WHICH THIS PROCESS IS CARRIED OUT, THE
9	STANDARDS THAT ARE SET AND MAINTAINED ALL THE WAY
10	THROUGH, AND THEN WHAT WE HEARD ABOUT THE SUCCESS
11	RATES OF THE PROGRAM WILL DEMONSTRATE TO THOSE WHO
12	HAVE QUESTIONS THAT WE ARE NOT SIMPLY
13	FUNDING PAYING OUT EVERY APPLICATION THAT COMES
14	IN THE DOOR, THAT WE ARE APPLYING THESE STANDARDS
15	AND WE ARE NOT GOING TO BE MOVED TO SUPPORT PROGRAMS
16	THAT DON'T HAVE THAT DON'T MEET THOSE STANDARDS.
17	I THINK THAT THAT'S ALL THAT REALLY NEEDS TO BE
18	SAID, DISSUADING PEOPLE OF THE IMPRESSION THAT WE'VE
19	GOT ALL THIS MONEY LYING AROUND AND WHOEVER SENDS IN
20	AN APPLICATION GETS MONEY. AND IT WILL BE EASY TO
21	MOVE THE NUMBERS THAT GIL GAVE US, RELEASE IT TO
22	KIND OF MAKE THE POINT THAT THAT'S NOT TRUE, THAT WE
23	SET STANDARDS AND MAINTAIN THEM. I THINK THAT'S
24	WHAT WE NEED TO BE ABLE TO SAY.
25	CHAIRMAN GOLDSTEIN: YEAH. I THINK THAT'S
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1	VERY SENSIBLE, KEITH. I'LL POINT OUT THAT WHICHEVER
2	APPROACH WE USE, WE WILL GET CRITICIZED FOR. SO WE
3	MIGHT AS WELL DO IT THE WAY IT'S GOING TO WORK BEST
4	FOR THE CITIZENS OF CALIFORNIA. MARIA HAS
