18	TEAM PLANNING AWARD INSTEAD. SO INSERTING THAT
19	PLANNING AWARD LENGTHENS THE WHOLE REVIEW PROCESS
20	FOR DISEASE TEAMS OUT TO 24 MONTHS.
21	I'VE ALSO LISTED SOME OTHER RFA'S. THE
22	ONES THAT ARE HIGHLIGHTED IN YELLOW YOU PROBABLY
23	HAVEN'T SEEN ON ANY OF THESE PROJECTIONS BEFORE. IN
24	FACT, YOU CAN'T EVEN SEE THEM AT ALL RIGHT NOW. BUT
25	THESE ARE THINGS THAT I THINK YOU'VE HEARD ALAN

1	TROUNSON TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT, THINGS THAT WE'VE
2	BEEN THINKING ABOUT AND TALKING ABOUT INTERNALLY
3	THAT WE MAY BRING TO THE BOARD AT SOME TIME IN THE
4	FUTURE. AND THOSE INCLUDE STEM CELL GENOMICS, ALPHA
5	CLINICS, AND DISEASE TEAM FOLLOW-ONS FOR PROVIDING
6	CLINICAL FUNDS FOR SOME OF THOSE EARLY DISEASE TEAM
7	PROJECTS THAT ARE SUCCESSFUL AND READY TO GO TO THE
8	CLINIC.
9	THE OTHER ASSUMPTIONS THAT ARE LISTED I
10	THINK ARE SUMMARIZED IN THE NEXT SLIDE. SO WHEN
11	I'VE DONE THIS, I'VE ASSUMED THAT ALL THE MONEY
12	THAT'S TARGETED FOR EACH RFA WILL ACTUALLY BE
13	COMMITTED. AS YOU KNOW, YOU OFTEN THE BOARD
14	OFTEN AWARDS MORE OR LESS THAN WHAT WAS ORIGINALLY
15	TARGETED. IF YOU ACTUALLY LOOK HISTORICALLY, THOSE
16	DIFFERENCES HAVE PRETTY MUCH BALANCED OUT OVER TIME.
17	AND MY ASSUMPTION IS THAT THOSE VARIANCES WILL
18	BALANCE OUT IN THE FUTURE.
19	I ALSO ASSUME THAT ALL FUNDS THAT ARE
20	COMMITTED WILL BE EXPENDED, AND THIS IS AN IMPORTANT
21	POINT BECAUSE FOR SOME OF THESE LARGE AWARDS, LIKE
22	EARLY TRANSLATION OR THE DISEASE TEAMS THAT ARE
23	MILESTONE BASED AND HAVE GO/NO-GO DECISION POINTS,
24	THERE MAY BE DECISIONS MADE TO TERMINATE SOME OF
25	THOSE EARLY. SO IT'S POSSIBLE THAT A SIGNIFICANT

1	AMOUNT OF MONEY COULD COME BACK TO CIRM TO BE
2	REINVESTED IN FUTURE RFA'S.
3	NOW, WE CHOSE NOT TO PUT ANY MONEY VALUE
4	TO THAT BECAUSE WE DON'T KNOW HOW MUCH MONEY MIGHT
5	COME BACK, AND WE DON'T KNOW WHEN IT MIGHT COME
6	BACK. OUR DECISION WAS THAT, WELL, WE'LL JUST DEAL
7	WITH THAT LATER. WHEN IT HAPPENS, WE'LL MAKE
8	ADJUSTMENTS. THAT WAS THE ASSUMPTION WE TOOK AT THE
9	TIME, BUT YOU CAN CERTAINLY ASSUME DIFFERENTLY AS
10	WE'LL TALK ABOUT IN A COUPLE OF MINUTES.
11	FINALLY, I ASSUMED THAT THERE WOULD BE NO
12	NEW MONEY THAT WOULD COME TO CIRM, NOTHING FROM
13	REVENUE SHARING. REVENUE SHARING, THOSE FUNDS WOULD
14	GO DIRECTLY TO THE STATE FUND, GENERAL FUND OF THE
15	STATE. THEY WOULDN'T COME TO CIRM.
16	LOAN REPAYMENTS, WE HAVE ONE LOAN OUT
17	THERE. IT'S NOT DUE TO BE REPAID UNTIL 2020. I'M
18	NOT ASSUMING THAT THAT'S GOING TO HAVE AN IMPACT ON
19	OUR LONG-TERM PROJECTIONS BECAUSE, AS YOU WILL SEE,
20	WE WOULD EXPECT TO HAVE ALREADY COMMITTED OUR LAST
21	RFA BEFORE 2020. AND WE COULD GET MONEY FROM
22	WARRANTS, BUT WE DON'T KNOW WHEN THAT MIGHT BE. WE
23	HAVEN'T ASSUMED ANYTHING IS GOING TO COME FROM
24	WARRANT SALES.
25	AND, FINALLY, WE DON'T ASSUME THERE WILL
	16

1	BE ANY BOND SALES AUTHORIZED BEYOND THE \$3 BILLION.
2	AGAIN, THAT COULD CHANGE, BUT AT THIS POINT, WE'RE
3	ASSUMING 3 BILLION IS ALL WE HAVE.
4	SO WITH THOSE ASSUMPTIONS AND THAT RFA
5	TABLE THAT I SHOWED YOU, IF WE PROJECT THAT OUT, WE
6	GET THIS SORT OF SPENDING PLAN WITH EACH OF THOSE
7	VERTICAL BARS BEING A FISCAL YEAR BETWEEN NOW AND TO
8	WHEN THE MONEY ENDS. THE GREEN LINE IS HOW MUCH
9	MONEY WE HAVE REMAINING. SO IT STARTS AT \$3 BILLION
10	AT THE UPPER LEFT; AND WITH TIME, IT PROJECTS DOWN.
11	THE BLUE ARROW AT THE BOTTOM SHOWS 2016-17 ON THIS
12	PROJECTION. THAT'S WHEN THE LAST RFA WOULD COME TO
13	THE BOARD FOR APPROVAL, AND ALL OF THE MONEY WOULD
14	BE EXPENDED BY 2020. SO THIS IS A DIFFERENT
15	SCENARIO THAN I SHOWED YOU IN JUNE. I SHOWED YOU
16	TWO IN JUNE. THIS IS SORT OF HALFWAY IN BETWEEN THE
17	TWO OF THEM. AND IT'S BECAUSE OF THE CHANGES THAT
18	WERE MADE IN THE ASSUMPTIONS.
19	NOW, IF WE HAVE THE NEXT SLIDE, THERE'S
20	ANOTHER RFA SCHEDULE THAT WAS PROVIDED TO YOU, AND
21	IT'S A LITTLE BIT DIFFERENT THAN THE ONE THAT I
22	SHOWED YOU. THE ACTUAL INDIVIDUAL RFA'S ARE NOT
23	THAT MUCH DIFFERENT. THERE ARE MORE THAT ARE TO BE
24	DETERMINED, BUT THERE'S ONE DIFFERENCE IN THE
25	ASSUMPTIONS. SO IN THAT ONE IT IS ASSUMED THAT \$190

1	MILLION WILL BE RETURNED THROUGH THE FACT THAT SOME
2	PROJECTS WOULD BE TERMINATED EARLY. AND THAT MONEY
3	IS THEN USED TO BUILD SOME NEW RFA'S TOWARDS THE END
4	OF CIRM'S LIFE. THAT'S A SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT SCHEME,
5	AND IT SHOWS YOU THAT UNDER THOSE CIRCUMSTANCES IT'S
6	NOT UNREASONABLE TO THINK THAT WE COULD STILL BE
7	AWARDING RFA'S INTO 2017 WHERE THE ONE I SHOWED YOU
8	WAS 2016.
9	SO THAT'S REALLY WHAT I WANTED TO SHOW YOU
10	AND EXPLAIN TO YOU WHAT WE'RE DOING. I THINK THESE
11	MODELS ARE USEFUL. THEY'RE QUITE FLEXIBLE. AS YOU
12	CAN SEE, WE CAN CHANGE THE ASSUMPTIONS, WE CAN
13	CHANGE THE VALUE OF THE DIFFERENT RFA'S, AND WE CAN
14	EASILY SHOW YOU WHAT THE IMPACT OF THAT IS ON THE
15	LONG-TERM FINANCIAL PLANNING. I THINK THIS IS
16	USEFUL INFORMATION FOR YOU IN MAKING STRATEGIC
17	DECISIONS ALONG WITH INFORMATION LIKE PORTFOLIO
18	ANALYSIS AND WHAT'S CHANGING IN THE FIELD AT THE
19	TIME OR WHAT WE FORESEE ARE GOING TO BE THE BIG
20	THINGS DOWN THE ROAD.
21	SO I JUST OFFER THAT TO YOU, AND IT'S OPEN
22	TO DISCUSSION. WE HAD A FAIRLY GOOD DISCUSSION
23	ABOUT THIS AT THE FINANCE SUBCOMMITTEE.
24	CHAIRMAN KLEIN: SO MICHAEL GOLDBERG I'M
25	GOING TO CALL UPON. JUST INFORMATIONALLY, DR.

1	ROBSON, THE \$190 MILLION ASSUMPTION, YOU HAD
2	MODIFIED THAT IN THE PRINTED MATERIAL WE GOT BEFORE
3	THE AUGUST MEETING. AND SO THAT'S NOT NEW TODAY,
4	BUT YOU'RE SAYING IT'S A CHANGE FROM JUNE. IT'S A
5	CHANGE FROM THE ASSUMPTIONS YOU MADE IN JUNE.
6	DR. ROBSON: I THINK THAT WAS IN THE JUNE
7	DOCUMENT. I'M SORRY. I DIDN'T UNDERSTAND.
8	CHAIRMAN KLEIN: THE \$190 MILLION, YOU
9	THINK THAT WAS IN THE JUNE DOCUMENT?
10	DR. ROBSON: I THINK IT WAS.
11	CHAIRMAN KLEIN: IT WAS AS EARLY AS JUNE.
12	I KNOW IT WAS PRIOR TO THE AUGUST MEETING WE HAD IT
13	IN THE PRINTED MATERIAL. THEN IN THE AUGUST MEETING
14	WE HAD BY THAT POINT ALREADY GONE THROUGH COMMITTEE
15	AND MADE A DECISION TO, IN FACT, MODIFY THE
16	SCHEDULES ON THOSE TWO DIFFERENT PROGRAMS.
17	MR. GOLDBERG.
18	MR. GOLDBERG: YES. I JUST WANTED TO
19	THANK JOHN FOR THIS UPDATE. THANKS TO MEMBERS OF
20	THE CHAIRMAN'S STAFF AS WELL WHO PROVIDED FEEDBACK.
21	THANK YOU. I JUST WANTED TO THANK JOHN FOR THE WORK
22	HE'S DONE ON THIS. ALSO THANK THE MEMBERS OF THE
23	CHAIRMAN'S OFFICE WHO ASSISTED IN THE PROCESS.
24	I THINK IT'S OUR VIEW, THE MEMBERS OF THE
25	SUBCOMMITTEE, THAT THE PROJECTIONS ARE AN ONGOING

1	KIND OF WORK IN PROGRESS, THAT WE WANT TO MAKE SURE
2	THAT WE'RE FLEXIBLE, THAT WE'RE NIMBLE, AND AGILE IN
3	RESPONSE TO THE EVOLVING NEEDS OF THE SCIENCE AND
4	THE TRANSLATIONAL CLINICAL ACTIVITIES THAT WE'RE
5	ANTICIPATING.
6	BY THE SAME TOKEN, I THINK IT WOULD BE
7	HELPFUL FOR US TO CREATE A FIXED PROJECTION THAT WE
8	OPERATE THE SAME WAY WE HAVE A FIXED BUDGET; THAT
9	IS, TO MAKE SURE THAT WE DON'T JUST KIND OF SLIDE
10	MEETING TO MEETING BASED ON A RANGE OF POSSIBLE
11	OUTCOMES THAT MAY BE THE SCENARIOS DU JOUR.
12	SO WHAT I'D LIKE TO PROPOSE IS THAT, IN
13	CONNECTION WITH THE FORMAL BUDGET PROCESS, THAT WE
14	ADOPT AN ONGOING FIXED VIEW OF OUR FORWARD CASH
15	FORECAST. IF WE NEED TO REVISIT THAT ON AN INTERIM
16	BASIS DURING A SPECIFIC FISCAL YEAR, I THINK WE CAN
17	DO THAT. BUT I'D LIKE TO DO THAT IN A FORMAL WAY IN
18	CONCERT WITH RATIFICATION BY THE FINANCE
19	SUBCOMMITTEE AND THE BOARD SO THAT WE'RE ALL
20	OPERATING, NOT JUST INTERNALLY, BUT ALSO THE PUBLIC
21	EXTERNALLY WITH THE MOST CLARITY THAT WE CAN PROVIDE
22	GIVEN OUR OBJECTIVE TO BE RESPONSIVE AND NIMBLE TO
23	OPPORTUNITIES. THANK YOU.
24	CHAIRMAN KLEIN: OKAY. AND AS BACKGROUND
25	TO THE PRESENTATION, I CONVEYED MR. SHEEHY'S CONCERN

1	FOR THE INFORMATION TO DR. ROBSON. AND I THINK,
2	JEFF, YOU HAVE SOME COMMENTS YOU WANTED TO MAKE. WE
3	WANT TO GO TO THE NEXT ITEM.
4	MR. SHEEHY: MY ONLY ISSUE WAS THAT THERE
5	WAS NO PROBLEM FULLY FUNDING DISEASE TEAMS II. AND
6	I THINK THAT THAT WAS THE QUESTION THAT WAS
7	INITIALLY ASKED AT THE LAST MEETING. I THINK THIS
8	IS CLEAR, THAT THAT IS NOT A PROBLEM.
9	CHAIRMAN KLEIN: YOU'RE SAYING AT THE \$230
10	MILLION LEVEL?
11	MR. SHEEHY: RIGHT. AT THE LEVEL THE
12	BOARD APPROVED.
13	CHAIRMAN KLEIN: OKAY. SO I THINK WE ALL
14	HAVE A CONSENSUS NOW THAT WE'RE FINE AT THAT FUNDING
15	LEVEL. ALL RIGHT. DR. TROUNSON.
16	DR. TROUNSON: I THINK THE I THINK THAT
17	WE WERE ASKED BY MEMBERS OF THE BOARD LAST TIME TO
18	GIVE AN INDICATION OF WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU MAKE
19	THOSE ADJUSTMENTS. AND I THINK THE BASIS OF JEFF'S
20	QUESTION IS THAT, YOU KNOW, THAT IF IT WAS A HUNDRED
21	MILLION OR 240 MILLION, HOW WOULD IT AFFECT IT. SO
22	WE WENT TO THE 240 MILLION. AND I THINK, YOU KNOW,
23	IT SEEMS TO BE PERFECTLY OKAY WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK
24	OF WHAT WE'RE DOING IF WE ACCEPT THAT WE ARE GOING
25	TO GO OUT TO 2016-17.

1	AND I THINK YOU AND I AT LEAST, CHAIRMAN,
2	ARE IN CONCERT IN THINKING, WELL, THAT'S ABOUT
3	RIGHT. IT WOULD CHANGE A FEW MONTHS IF YOU MADE
4	ADJUSTMENTS, BUT IT PRIMARILY FITS IN THAT
5	FRAMEWORK.
6	AND THE ONLY THING THAT I WOULD SAY IS
7	THAT I THINK WE'RE GOING TO BE OFFERED SOME VERY
8	INTERESTING OPPORTUNITIES FROM THE EXTERNAL REVIEW
9	COMING UP, THEIR REPORT. SO IT SHOULD BE I AGREE
10	WITH MICHAEL. THERE SHOULD BE GREAT DEAL OF
11	FLEXIBILITY THERE. AND IF WE CAN AGREE TO SOME
12	CONSTANTS AND SOME VARIABLES, THAT WOULD BE
13	TERRIFIC. BUT I THINK THERE'S GOING TO BE QUITE AN
14	INTERESTING DISCUSSION, I THINK, WITH THOSE EXTERNAL
15	REVIEWERS ABOUT OUR PROGRAM.
16	AND SO IN TERMS OF INFORMATION FOR THE
17	BOARD, THAT GROUP OF EXTERNAL REVIEWERS, ALL OF THEM
18	ARE HOPING TO COME TO THE MEETING IN DECEMBER TO
19	TALK TO THE BOARD. AND THIS IS INCLUDING MARTIN
20	EVANS WHO COMES FROM CARDIFF IN WALES. HE WANTS TO
21	BE HERE WHEN THEY PRESENT THEIR REVIEW TO THE BOARD.
22	SO I THINK IT WOULD MAKE, IF WE HAVE TIME,
23	CHAIR, TO MAKE TIME AVAILABLE IN THE DECEMBER
24	MEETING MIGHT BE VERY INSTRUCTIVE, VERY INTERESTING,
25	AND THEN FURTHER THOUGHTS ABOUT OUR EXPENDITURES AND

1	BUDGETS MIGHT FLOW FROM WHATEVER STRATEGIES WE MAY
2	DEVELOP FROM THERE.
3	CHAIRMAN KLEIN: IN ORDER TO HAVE THE
4	OPPORTUNITY FOR THE WHOLE BOARD TO REALLY
5	SUBSTANTIVELY ENGAGE WITH THE REVIEW PANEL WHICH, AS
6	DR. TROUNSON SAID, HAS DECLARED THEIR WILLINGNESS TO
7	COME IN TOTAL TO THE DECEMBER 8TH MEETING, INCLUDING
8	SIR MARTIN EVANS, WHO GOT THE NOBEL PRIZE FOR HIS
9	STEM CELL RESEARCH, RICK KLAUSNER, WHO WAS THE HEAD
10	OF THE NATIONAL CANCER INSTITUTE AND STARTED THE
11	GATES FOUNDATION, REALLY A SET OF PREEMINENT
12	INDIVIDUALS, ALLEN BERNSTEIN, DR. ALLEN BERNSTEIN,
13	WHO HEADS THE GLOBAL HIV VACCINE PROJECT, WE HAVE AN
14	EXTRAORDINARY ABILITY TO HAVE A SUBSTANTIVE
15	INTERCHANGE WITH THIS GROUP IN A PUBLIC FORMAT WHERE
16	WE CAN DISCUSS LONG-TERM STRATEGY. AND I'M GOING TO
17	HAVE MELISSA KING SURVEY THE BOARD BECAUSE I BELIEVE
18	THAT IT'S GOING TO BE SUCH A MATERIAL FOCUS OF THAT
19	MEETING ALONG WITH THE GRANT CYCLE WE'LL BE GOING
20	THROUGH, THAT WE'RE GOING TO NEED TO HAVE A SEPARATE
21	BOARD MEETING POTENTIALLY IN THE AREA OF THE 15TH OR
22	16TH OF DECEMBER TO DEAL WITH THE ELECTIONS AND
23	BRINGING IN THE NEW MEMBERS.
24	I WOULD SUGGEST THAT THAT IS A VERY GOOD
25	MEETING THAT ANYONE WHO'S BEEN NOMINATED TO THE

1	BOARD AS A POTENTIAL NEW APPOINTEE TO COME TO THAT
2	MEETING TO GET ORIENTED TO A REALLY DEEP DISCUSSION
3	FROM SOME OF THE GREAT THINKERS ON A GLOBAL BASIS OF
4	THE POSSIBILITIES OF NEW PROGRAMS THAT WE CAN HAVE.
5	SO WE'RE GOING TO HAVE SOME FINANCE CHALLENGES HERE,
6	SOME SCIENTIFIC CONCEPTUAL CHALLENGES OF SOME WAYS
7	THAT WE COULD REALLY INNOVATE IN A WAY THAT PERHAPS
8	THE NIH DOESN'T HAVE THE SAME OPPORTUNITY. IT'S AN
9	EXTRAORDINARY OPPORTUNITY WE HAVE HERE WHICH WAS
LO	IMPRESSED UPON US CONSTANTLY BY THE REVIEW PANEL
L1	DURING THEIR MEETINGS. AND TO HAVE THE BOARD HAVE
L2	THE ABILITY TO HAVE A ONE-ON-ONE PUBLIC INTERCHANGE
L3	WITH THIS GROUP, I THINK, WILL REALLY CONTRIBUTE TO
L4	THE FUTURE DEFINITION OF OUR MISSION AND REFINING
L5	OUR TARGETS AND OBJECTIVES.
L6	WITH THAT JONATHAN WELCOME. WITH THAT,
L7	I THINK THAT WE'RE IN A POSITION THAT WE CAN ADJOURN
L8	FOR OUR EXECUTIVE SESSION. AND COULD COUNSEL, MR.
L9	HARRISON, PLEASE CITE THE BASIS OF THAT. AND THEN
20	LOGISTICALLY I'M GOING TO HAVE MELISSA KING TALK TO
21	US ABOUT WHERE THE EXECUTIVE SESSION IS GOING TO BE
22	HELD AND TIMING ISSUES.
23	MS. KING: BEFORE WE DO THAT, JUST FOR THE
24	RECORD, ROBERT QUINT AND JONATHAN SHESTACK HAVE

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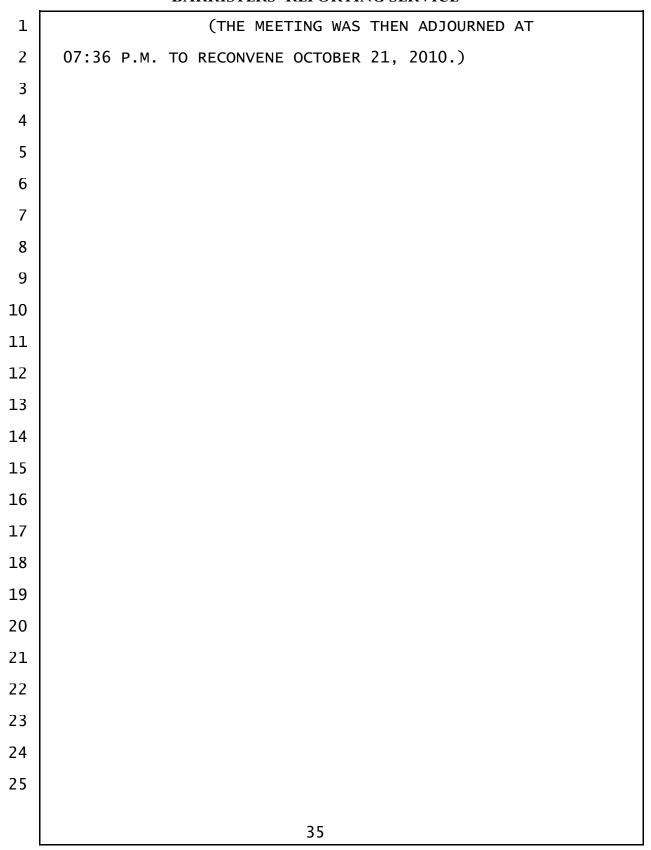
